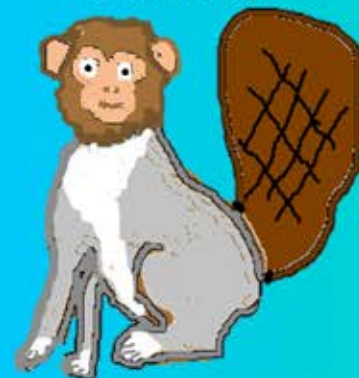
To our June newsletter, as the summer approaches, the sun is shining and the end of term is drawing near, we hope to share stories and inspire young people.
